I really think this class would benefit from having a prerequisite of knowing at least something about Latin America; classmates seemed mostly interested in discussion when it turned toward the US, which was very much not the point of the class.

The readings are fascinating and never superfluous. Entering this course, I was under the impression that as a History seminary on media and politics in Latin America, we would be engaging more with the history of politics in Latin America and the role of media in shaping it. However, the class is a much more philosophical discussion of the role of media in people's lives. It is discussed in very abstract terms, and the class discussion was almost never tied to the specific regime changes in Latin America. It is not what I expected from the course, so I felt dissatisfied with the material. Additionally, the students had a very hard time engaging in meaningful conversation. Class discussion were sparse and lacking depth. Professor Salgado tried to reframe his questions to garner more interest from the class but it rarely worked as the questions became more complex and harder to track. He's a very sweet many who obviously care about the subject and is very knowledgeable on it, but the class just wasn't for me personally.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> He grades participation harshly for each class. However, he is very encouraging and approachable. Professor Salgado was great. I think sometimes the questions he would ask during seminar could be a little confusing, but overall I really liked how he led discussions and that he gave you opportunities to participate even if you hadn't done all of the readings. The participation grading was a little intense too, and I think relieving some of the pressure of this grade would make people less anxious about participation. It is unconscionable to me that Columbia is not hiring Prof. Salgado, and that he will not be here next academic year. He is truly an invaluable professor: he makes every effort to connect with students, works hard to make the class as best as possible, puts thought and time into discussions and readings, and creates projects that are constructively challenging to students, without being overbearing but allowing students to extend themselves. I really wish my class had been more talkative, as Prof. Salgado was kind of forced to fill in a lot of the gaps or the silence. Prof. Salgado returned assignments with the utmost expediency and gave thorough, fair feedback. He made it clear that his door was always open and was always willing to speak to students. Professor Salgado tried to lead class discussions with his long list of questions which he would reframe when almost no one answered the first time around. I'm not sure it was his fault; the students rarely seemed interested in engaging with the material. Some people likely found it interesting but hard to follow as it was sometimes difficult to discern what he was specifically asking us. I also did not think his one on one meetings to discuss the paper were helpful to me in the sense that I felt he pushed back a lot on my ideas. It also felt this way during the class discussions. I could tell it was coming from a good place of trying to get me to think about the subject differently, but it also seemed like he was projecting one right answer to the discussion or my personal research question. In the last two weeks, he split us up into discussion groups in which we got to choose what questions to answer amongst ourselves, and this was a much better way to run the course.
